


Manble Ban Phimany School

Dear Marble Bar Community,

Did you know that, from one end to the other, Marble Bar is about 1.5 km long?

If you drive that at an average speed of 50km/hour, it will take you 108 seconds.

If, instead, you would speed at 100km/hour, you would arrive early at your destination a whopping 54 seconds! I know that doesn't sound like much, and it isn't really, on a human timescale.

So please be considerate, take your time driving through our lovely town, we will love you for it.

By the time this message will get to you, a new "Banned Drinkers Register" will have been introduced in the Pilbara.

A person will be put on this list if they get charged with any (serious) offence while they are drunk, so for example, if a person has been drinking alcohol and they assault someone, or they damage property, or they steal something.

Anybody on the register won't be allowed to buy take-away alcohol for three months.

If they get caught drinking in that time, it's another 6 months, and if they get caught in that time, it's 12 months! If someone supplies alcohol to a person on the register, they will be put on it as well.

Any licenced premises will ask for ID for take-away alcohol to check whether you are on the register.

The second instalment of The Thursday Murder Club series by Richard Osman, yet again proved a big hit with the book club.



She needed to be brave. Life in "the Bar" was tough: although - the unit was spacious – with airconditioning. A small back yard with enough room for a veggie garden. The people were friendly and considerate. But John was soon very involved with his school. Rosie discovered there was no prospect of any part-time work for a receptionist in this town.

Then the dog arrived. Rosie found him one morning. Panting heavily in the meagre shade of a bush at her front fence. A bitch. 
