What's Cooking?

Sicilian Whole Orange Cake



Method

1. Preheat oven to 175°C
2. Prepare and line an 8" spring form pan with baking paper and spray the paper
3. Place the eggs and sugar in a large bowl and beat with a mixer until light and fluffy.
4. Sift the flour with the baking powder then add to the mixture in the bowl a little at a time along with the softened butter. Continue to mix until completely blended, then stir in the yoghurt.
5. In a food processor, process the whole orange until it is almost pureed.
6. Add this orange to the cake mixture along with the vanilla and stir until combined, then pour batter into prepared tin.
7. Bake for 50-60 minutes, test cake with skewer. Allow to cool for 15 mins, then remove from pan.

Ingredients

- 3 eggs
- 250g sugar
- 275g plain flour
- 2 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/3 cup softened butter
- 1/3 cup plain Greek yoghurt
- 1 large orange cut into pieces with the rind but remove the seeds
- 1 tsp vanilla



THE 10 DESERT CHALLENGE

I had a visit the other day from a lady by the name of Maree Stephenson, who is currently undertaking the '10 Desert Challenge' in order to raise funds for Beyond Blue. If she is successful, she will be the first woman to complete the 10,000km journey which takes her along 10 desert tracks in outback Australia.

On the 2nd of May Maree left her home in Brisbane for Birdsville on her bike Banjo. By the time she rolled into Marble Bar she'd already travelled 5456km and raised \$7,570.00 in donations. She's on schedule - actually a day ahead! - but still not expecting to get back to Birdsville until mid-September. When she does she's looking forward to catching up with her partner and 7 year old son, where they'll be waiting to meet her so they can all head out together on yet another desert adventure!

Apparently Maree has done other bicycle challenges before, they tend to tie in with significant phases in her life.

"I've always been drawn to challenges, they're my way of learning and growing. I use extreme challenges to grow myself - to be my bigger, stronger, wiser, kinder self."

It's certainly a massive journey to undertake by bicycle but Maree revels in it.

"I'm drawn to these challenges, especially if on paper it's not possible. It's the message I want

to pass to my son - anything is possible"

The LGT Team enjoyed sitting with the children and doing the marble painting and mandala arts and craft activity.


The first week of the school holidays we had new faces come in and enjoy the activities and were amazed with the Rec Shed and what was inside our big pink building.

CALIDUS INFORMATION SESSION

On Tuesday the 8th of June, the CRC hosted Calidus Resources for a third community information session at the Civic Centre.

Managing Director Dave Reeves gave a presentation on the progress of the Warrawoona mine development and the recent development of the camp, showing photos of the newly refurbished facilities including a new gym and wet mess.

Calidus have now received their operating permits, awarded all contracts and commenced process plant construction at Warrawoona. Exploration work is still ongoing including a recently completed scoping study to integrate the Blue Spec mine near Nullagine into their operations. The upgrade of the Marble Bar airstrip with the Shire and Atlas Iron is also moving forward (though at greater expense than initially budgeted!)

With the current timetable progressing as planned, Calidus anticipates first gold production around

April 2022.

After the presentation was an opportunity for question time. In response to a query about upgrades to the road to Warrawoona, Dave clarified that Calidus were only anticipating a maximum of 1-2 trucks through a day, though they are planning to widen the road and open corners and improve the general safety of the road.

The presentation was closed with thanks from Councillor Lang Coppin, before everyone tucked in to dinner and took the opportunity to chat with Dave and the team from Calidus.

Thanks to Calidus for coming along for the session, we're looking forward to that the next one which will hopefully include a tour of Warrawoona!

Welcome to the Shire of East Pilbara's Waste Services' Update

NEWMAN RECYCLES

For the first time, the Shire is sending Newman's recycling to Cleanaway's Material Recovery Facility (MRF) for recycling! Recent bin tagging has proved successful in providing helpful feedback to residents, with contamination rates dropping from 40% to 7% in 12 weeks! See the data showing recycling contamination rates dropping to a low enough level for recycling!

If we continue with correct recycling practices, this means diverting about 2.5 times the volume of the Newman Pool worth of materials from landfill every year and extending the landfill life!

Thank you to the Newman community for your efforts! Please continue with correct recycling practices, so we can continue to reduce waste sent to landfill, for the benefit of our community and environment.

Remember, recycle only these 5 things:

- Steel and aluminum cans (rinsed)
- Plastic bottles and containers (no lids & rinsed)
- Cardboard (flattened)
- Paper
- Glass bottles and jars (no lids & rinsed)

NEW COMMUNITY RECYCLING DROP-OFF POINTS

Shire of East Pilbara's new Recycling Hubs and Recycling Station provide residents with free and convenient drop off points to dispose of those 'tricky' items that can't be recycled through the kerbside recycling bin service.

The Recycling Hubs accepting batteries, printer cartridges, small e-waste and mobile phones are located at:

- Newman Shire Admin Building
- Newman Library
- East Pilbara Refund Point, Yates Road Newman
- Nullagine Works Depot
- Marble Bar Admin Building

A larger Recycling Station is located at the Newman Waste Management Facility (end of Yates Road, Newman) and accepts the below waste types for safe disposal and recycling:



BIN STICKERS IN NULLAGINE AND MARBLE BAR

In May, the Shire's Waste Services team visited Nullagine and Marble Bar to deliver bin stickers created by local students. The Nullagine designs by Andrew Yaballar, Kaysen Francis, Zyroseina Yaballar, Noelle O'Conner and Terrence Malana that are now displayed on residents' bins around Nullagine to encourage everyone to keep the Town tidy. The artworks include the message in local language: 'Jurra rapiji piinja', which is roughly translated to 'put your rubbish in the bin' in Martu Wangka spoken by community members at Irrungadji Community. The students were very proud of their work!



The Marble Bar designs by Kelliemarie Stream Dhu, Jacob Whalebone, Nathaniel Carbett and Sharne Mason displayed on residents' bins around Marble Bar, are also spreading messages of keeping the town clean and tidy. A big thank you to all the teachers for facilitating the creation of these impressive artworks and to Keep Australia Beautiful for the support and funding towards this project, to help keep our towns clean and tidy by spreading the message. Be sure to keep an eye out for these colourful artworks in Nullagine and Marble Bar!

OVER 1.4 MILLION CONTAINERS DEPOSITED IN JUNE

After 9 months of operation, about 1.4 million containers have been deposited to the East Pilbara Refund Point by the end of June.

That's an incredible effort, with:

- \$140,000 injected back into the community
- \$14,000 in donations to local community groups and charities

Thank you to everyone using the refund point to recycle their drink containers!

Through bin tagging, we have noticed a lot of drink containers eligible for a 10c refund in recycling and general waste bins. Instead, return them to our refund point to reduce landfill and cash in!

Marble Bar VR Showcase

Students, teachers and community have been working on an exciting project to transform student's artwork into a first of its kind 3D Art Virtual Reality (VR) Gallery. The project is a culmination of the school's 2020 participation in the BHP PEP 5 Program with CSIRO and Airborne IT.

On the 20th and 21st of June, Principal Shane Wilson, teacher George Pantazis and Airborne IT Operations Manager Marc French travelled to the Resources Technologies Showcase at the convention centre in Perth to present the Gallery as it went live on AltspaceVR. The Altspace platform allows anyone in the world with a VR kit to take a virtual stroll through the gallery and experience the student's artwork, an opportunity taken up by 100 international guests from the USA, Japan, UK and the EU. The Showcase itself was also attended by many significant figures including the Director General for the Department of Education Lisa Rogers and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Education and Training Terry Healy MLA, who were among the 633 people who stepped into the MBPS VR booth.

Shane Wilson is passionate about the project and pleased by its reception at the convention.

"We have had students and staff from over 50 schools, government, corporate executive, industry partners, mining giants... parents, and community members participate and be impacted by our... project. The feedback from many has been absolutely positive and has confirmed that this is the direction we need to continue to take."

"For me personally, it has been a career highlight to share culturally responsive STEM with so many students and staff from across the government school system, independent school system and private school system." - Shane Wilson

COP'S CORNER

Marble Bar

There are two officers stationed at Marble Bar Station. Like most small regional towns there are no front counter staff, or fixed opening hours. We understand it can be frustrating when there may be no one present at the Police Station, however our patrol area can take us hundreds of kilometres away from Marble Bar and mobile phone signal is not always achievable in remote WA.

Unfortunately we cannot divert the station phone number to a mobile for us to carry, this is because the majority of our area doesn't have mobile phone coverage. This is not just a Marble Bar thing, it is a state wide directive. Local police would like to ensure when you are seeking assistance you are equipped with the correct contact details and your question is answered.

- » Something which has happened in the past;
- » A property-related incident for insurance purposes;






LOCAL HISTORY

~ Mullewa Mail - July 12 1923 ~

Since my last letter Marble Bar has been going gay. There has been a race meeting, fancy dress ball, concert and many other things amongst them six barrels of beer.

The race meeting was very successful. Of course all the favourites did not win but that did not prevent any from smiling.

The prize for the best fancy costume was secured by Miss Mills who appeared as a Lady of the Harem. Mr Sleep was awarded the prize for the costume as Henry the VIII. The other costumes noted were as follows Mrs Ains (Puritan Maid), Mrs Kiasing (Queen of Clubs), Mrs Davidson (Gold Tipped Cigarette), Miss Hedditch (Goddess of Wine), Miss Wilson (Sheik's Wife), Miss Pine (Pierette Black and Gold), miss Elsie Coppin (Black Cat), Miss Kathleen Coppin (Angel of Peace), Mrs Mills (Swan Beer).

The concert was very successful. The Jazz band rendered their items very creditably. Mr Taylor cornet, and Mr Norrell violin rendered the item of the evening.

The eighteenth annual meeting of this club took place last week and was a decided success. The club deserves credit for the manner in which the meeting was worked up, and for the successful termination to which it was brought. To the writer's mind the only blot on the proceedings was the declaration that "only registered bookmakers would be allowed to bet" and the admission of two unregistered men who displayed their "ability" with sufficient success, it is hoped, to teach the club a lesson worth future remembrance.

Hedland visitors speak highly of the hospitality of the Barites, no effort being spared to make the trip an enjoyable one.

The Marble Bar Race Club held a race meeting on Monday last, January 2, which was well attended, and proved a success from every point of view, contributed to considerably by the enthusiasm displayed by the committee generally and the Secretary in particular.

There was a number of visitors from the surrounding districts, a special train conveying the Hedland contingent, the wonted urbanity of the Barites at once making everyone feel at home.

The fields were good, as many as eight horses accepting in some races.

The only drawback (which was not such from a publicans stand point) was the excessive heat, from the effects of which the Barites seem to be immune.

One would be inclined to think that in an old settled, small community like the Bar there would be a little of the unpleasantness which characterises other places we know of (writs, threats, strife, etc) but such is not the case, the town is unfettered by such disagreeableness and

all bend their energies towards helping the town along. The stamp of the old digger spirit has left it's impression, and may the day be far distant when such good influences cease to rule.

"Bingy Race" terminated the day's meeting, but the sport continued far into the night.

Marble Bar Week

~ The Phillip River Times - June 16 1906~

Once more the annual meeting of the Marble Bar Racing Club is upon us, and all are eagerly looking forward to the festivities connected with what is now known as the "Marble Bar Week" This is the one week in the year that we, in and around Marble Bar, all look forward to, in the hope that we can secure sufficient pleasure in that short space of time to enable us to look back upon it without one pang of regret, and that at it's conclusion only pleasant memories are left. In this one week in the year the people forget their petty little troubles, and it seems to be their endeavour to also make the visitors do the same, and combine to make the best of everything, and look upon the rosy side of life. The "Week" could possibly be improved upon, but at present there seems to be a variety of pleasure that few can find fault with. The fun commences on Monday, when the bachelors of Marble Bar tender a ball to the visitors and others. On Wednesday the first days racing takes place, and in the evening there will be a concert and dance. The annual cricket match, between the visitors and Marble Bar, will be played on Thursday, while the second days racing will take place the following day (Friday). Such a programme should satisfy most people. In thinking of this round of pleasure, it must not be forgotten that the Marble Bar Race Club is indirectly responsible for the whole of the festivities commencing on Monday next, and we are pleased to think that the race meeting promises to be one of the most successful yet held here. The number of entries received constitutes a record, so that everything promises well. With such a large number of men at Moolyella, the attendance should be the biggest seen for some years past. We trust that the race club will this year have a bigger credit balance than ever before, so that in two years hence they will be in a position to cater for the hundreds of people who will be brought here by special and ordinary trains.

ANIMAL WATCH:

PILBARA GRASSWREN (*AMYTORNIS WHITEI*)

The Pilbara Grasswren (otherwise known as the Rufous Grasswren) was previously thought to be a variant of the Striated Grasswren family, but recently was declared it's own species. This particular species is only found in the Pilbara, as the name implies! There are no other types of grasswren in the Pilbara.

Pilbara Grasswrens are not easy to spot, as like most wrens they are very quick both on ground and in flight. They prefer to remain on the ground and like to hang out in the rocky hills scurrying between clumps of spinifex. You can see from the photo that their colours allow them to blend perfectly into that environment.

They are found from Exmouth to around Nullagine but most commonly seen in the Tom Price area.

The Grasswren, like most wrens, have a beautiful call which is pretty hard to describe

but you can find the sound on the web if you google Pilbara Grasswren - it's worth a listen! I'm making it my mission to try and spot a Pilbara Grasswren one of these days!

MARBLE BAR

~West Australian~
July 29 1901

Some time ago a Chinaman died at Poondina, 12 miles on this side of Port Hedland. It was supposed at the time that he had been kicked by a horse. He was buried, and no more was heard of the matter until a few days ago, when owing to information received, Corporal Breen arrested a man named Riddle on suspicion of having killed the Chinaman. A native is the informant. Riddle was brought before the Magistrate here on Friday, and remanded for eight days.

The weather has been very unpleasant during the last few days. A cold easterly wind has been blowing day and night.

MARBLE BAR

~Western Mail~
July 6 1902

Much indignation has been expressed throughout this district at the closing of the Warrawoona Telephone and Post Office. Warrawoona is on the main line to Nullagine, and a coach goes through the town every week. Not only does Warrawoona suffer, but the whole district, including Yandicoogina, Elsie Creek, and other places are affected. The people of Warrawoona will have to go 20 miles to send a telegram, and residents of Yandicoogina and Elsie Creek will have to go 40 miles. Over 100 people will be greatly inconvenienced, and when it is considered that only £50 per annum was being allowed for keeping the office open, the wisdom of the Postal Department does not seem very clear.

The flying doctor arrived on Thursday last instead of the usual Wednesday in answer to an urgent call to pick up a patient at Mulga Downs station, which was received on the Tuesday, when on making a landing at dusk by aid of flares both the doctor and pilot were badly shaken.

Messrs. W Goode of Pilga and A Hay of Hillside passed through town on 16th on a round trip to Mt Edgar, Noreena, Roy Hill and Bamboo Springs.

The cricket club had a successful dance on Saturday, and members visited Mt Edgar to play a return match against J Cocking's team the next day and scored a victory.

Mr Blatchford, geologist, lately in employ of Comet Gold Mines Ltd, arrived on the 19th inst., and the State Mining Engineer, Mr Wilson, and the Inspector of mines have also just arrived to look over the mines and mining district generally.

The Commissioner of Railways, Mr Ellis, and party met business men and pastoralists in the hall on Saturday 17th inst. The party left overland for the Meekatharra next day.

Major Seaton, of the Salvation Army, and Mrs Seaton, have been visitors to town, and held service in the town hall on Sunday night.

Mr and Mrs A.R Darlington and Shirley returned from Meentheena on the 19th inst., bound for Talga and then home to Callawa after an enjoyable round trip.

After being successful in disposing of most of their interests, Mr and Mrs J. Speirs left today for Yalgoo where they

will probably settle down in a new mining venture.

The Debating Society, evolved from the Dramatic Club held their first meeting in the hall last night and the splendid muster of enthusiastic debaters promises well for the meeting on August 4 next.

Mr R Watson of Bamboo Creek is an in-patient of the nursing home, and although he has had a bad turn, is much better now.

Eight motor cars conveyed the mourners who attended the funeral, which was the biggest ever witnessed in Marble Bar for many years. Mr H. A man named Archie Clive came in today from Sharks with two nuggets weighing 209ozs and 30ozs respectively. There was little stone in them.

Clive is the prospector, who a few years ago, found the "Bobby Dazzler" nugget, the largest found in the state.

The two latest nuggets were found in the same place as the "Bobby Dazzler" was picked up. Clive states that he made the find at less than three feet from the surface.

July 3 1909

Mrs Ellen Maher, a very old and respected resident of

this town passed away yesterday afternoon, after a short illness. She was well known throughout the North West, was loved and respected by all who knew her, and leaves a family of four sons and two daughters. The funeral took place today and was attended by all who could get away, being by far the largest funeral the Bar has ever seen.

The races and race week passed quietly. Never has Marble Bar experienced such a quiet race time. Most of the river folk were down with measles and could not attend nor send their horses.

The rain has freshened and bought a greener tinge in the country, has filled all the water holes and cleaned out creeks and rivers. Had it fallen a few months earlier feed would now be good.

Mining is going on in a quiet way here. Cooper is trying to get the old battery to work again, and has already been a week repairing, etc preparing for a start. He states that he will not run this battery any more unsatisfactory for him, and the men putting the stone through think that under the circumstances it would pay to cart the stone 18 miles to Warrawoona to crush.

Davan's new find, near the well, is opening up well and promises to turn out trumps. Cooper can get no word about the battery and is still fighting hard, but has absolutely no help from any persons in this town.

The progress Association took the matter up for one night, then blew themselves out, and now peacefully slumber. The petition the Association started with has at last, I think, found it's way to the waste paper basket.

Mr Schlapp visited this town especially to inspect the asbestos property near Wymans. From what can be gathered he seemed pleased with quality, but doubted if it would pay under existing circumstances, being too costly to treat. He had very little time to look round.

At Warrawoona, mining is going on steadily and the syndicate battery working away on Boulder stone taken from the old stope. The Government has granted £500 to exploit the Klondyke Boulder property and timber is on the way. It is intended to push on the sinking of the main shaft. This property will employ a good few hands shortly.

Branley and Richards are putting down a pumping plant on the Gift, and Rankin and party are hard at work on the Gauntlet.

Beurteaux and party found a new leader just above Kopie's reward, which dollies well.

Have had no news from eastern Creek but think they should now be crushing full time, as they have had plenty of rain there.

Corboy and Kelly left here last week with a load of tucker. They intend working a copper show on the other side of Mt. Edgar.

W. Abbott found a mineral lode a few days since near the race course and has sent samples away for assay, no one here knowing for certain what the mineral stone contains.


Mr Moody of De Grey, met with a nasty accident to his head this week, while engaged in building work, and is now in a critical condition.
