Are you a traceability ace?

Stock traceability is the first step in good biosecurity and is a key part of everyday sound farm management practices. Traceability is essential to maintain access to export markets and for food safety. It allows stock to be traced for disease or residue purposes and deters stock theft.

How are animals traced?

If you own cattle or other livestock, you must register as an owner of livestock, identify stock correctly, obtain a property identification code (PIC) for each property where you keep them and record movements to your property on the National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) database.

Cattle must have a registered identifier (brand and/or earmark) and an NLIS electronic device that enables animals to be tracked from property of birth to slaughter or export.

Don't break WA's livestock traceability chain

A weak link can break traceability and cost you market access.

1 Register as an owner of livestock and obtain a property identification code (PIC) for each property where you keep livestock

2 Identify your livestock correctly. See agric.wa.gov.au and search 'livestock NLIS'

3 Complete a NVD/waybill every time you move stock from a PIC

4 Record within 48 hours on the NLIS database all stock coming onto property

Cattle Industry Funding Scheme

Are your cattle registered to your property?

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) find that half of all traceability non-compliance issues involve cattle that are not registered to the PIC they are leaving from. This breaks our traceability chain, is a potential biosecurity and market risk and can also hold up processing at the abattoir.

Don't get caught out!

Now - and not when loading the truck - is the time to check that your cattle are registered to your property by using an NLIS scanner. Scan the tags and DPIRD can assist you to run a check on the NLIS database and to update any missing movements.

SHIRE OF EAST PILBARA CEO RESIGNS

INTERVIEW WITH JEREMY EDWARDS

As you might be aware, Shire of East Pilbara Chief Executive Officer Jeremy Edwards has announced he will be standing down from his position in December 2020.

Mr. Edwards has been working with the Shire for three years since taking on the role in March of 2018. According to a Shire of East Pilbara media release on the 22nd of October 2020, "community satisfaction

with the Shire increased significantly, with an overall increase in satisfaction of 8% up to 73%" during his time as CEO. He leaves the Pilbara to take on the role of CEO for the City of Swan.

I asked Mr. Edwards if he'd be willing to answer a few questions for the Mirage, check out the interview below.

Tell us something about yourself that you think most people probably don't know - hobbies, interests etc.

I love the outdoors and the Pilbara is a fantastic playground for camping and exploring, this is something that we have really enjoyed and will be back every year to continue our adventures. Something that people don't know about me is that my wife and I are very proud owners of 2 miniature dachshunds called Bentley and Bella, they are treated nearly as good as our children.

What was the reason for your decision to move on?

This was really difficult and it is purely around career development and opportunity to lead in a larger Local Government system. Both my partner and I were really happy in the East Pilbara and the opportunities it has to offer.

What do you consider your proudest achievement in your time as SoEP CEO - for the Shire generally and for the remote towns such as Marble Bar?

This would have to be building the systems at the Shire to cater for our future growth and challenges. The Shire has over \$40 billion of construction planned and projects on the horizon to support this such as the Marble Bar Airport, the General Industry Land at Newman and upgrades to critical infrastructure such as the Waste Water treatment Plant which will contribute to positioning the Shire for this growth.

What did you enjoy most about your role as SoEP CEO? What did you find most challenging or surprising?

What I loved about my role was and is the people – such characters and personalities across our Shire. The most challenging component is the ability to attract staff to the region as we don't have the luxury of having a large population to draw from and at times it's really difficult to attract people to relocate to the Pilbara. After working here I can't seem to understand why this is. This is why we have worked hard at selling the region and promoting its opportunities in an attempt to attract staff to the Shire.

Is there anything you wish you could have done but didn't have the time to achieve or would have loved to have done if you had infinite time and money at your disposal?

This would have to be the ability to have the finance to provide better services and facilities particularly in the regions. The community in these areas deserve the services and facilities however the economies of scale just aren't there. This is not only from a Local Government perspective but a State Government one as well especially when you look at service provision around health and community services (housing etc.)

What are you most looking forward to about your new role?

Certainly the challenges of leading a large Metropolitan Council and also addressing the diversity that such a large population such as the City of Swan will bring.

What are you most looking forward to about moving down south?

From a personal perspective we are looking forward to being closer to family, we have become grandparents this year and have another on the way due in February 2021, it will be really nice to have the family closer to us.

What will you miss the most about the Pilbara?

The people, the weather, the amazing outdoor life, the camping, the relaxed atmosphere, the fact that we have no traffic lights and congestion the list goes on! There is a lot to miss about this about amazing part of our State.

Why did you get into local government as a career?

I originally got into Local Government because of the diversity it offers, it's a fantastic career whereby you are not doing the same thing day in day out. The other reason is that it's the closest form of Government to the community, both State and federal are removed from what really happens in our community and this is sometimes why Local Government operates at a grass roots level. I have been in the sector for 30 years and I truly love what I do.

What advice would you give to anyone interested in getting into local government?

It's a fantastic career that can offer you a number of different career paths, it's always interesting and challenging and if you are comfortable in moving around the State it can provide you with a good work life balance whilst living and working in the regions.

What does the future hold, beyond the City of Swan?


I haven't really thought much more beyond this next challenge, I am going to take the next couple of years settling in and then I will see what the future holds.

OVER SEVEN YEARS OF SERVICE

COUNCILLOR DEAN HATWELL RETIRES

As you might be aware, Dean Hatwell has retired from his role as Shire of East Pilbara Councillor for the Central Ward which represents Marble Bar.

Dean served as Councillor for more than seven years after being elected to the position in 2013 and re-elected in 2017. The next Central Ward Councillor will be elected at an Extraordinary Election to be held in February of 2021. (see below)

We chatted to Dean about his role and resignation.

Why are you resigning and what are your plans?

I'm moving to Port Hedland because I want to be closer to my grandkids. Also so I can be closer to health support, though I don't have any immediate health concerns, it's just about looking after my underlying health. It's sooner than I expected but circumstances necessitated the move. I'll visit and remain involved with Marble Bar, I'll still work with the CRC, but I'll be spending less time here.

Why did you first take on the Councillor role?

I've always been community minded, I first came here for a CRC job. Over the years I've been generally involved in community issues and activities, I served on Council in Port Adelaide. Being on Council gave me an opportunity to advocate for the community.

What do you consider your proudest achievement in your role as Councillor?

That I was able to represent the residents of Marble Bar and advocate in regards to facilities and services. Over 5 years ago I initially queried upgrades to the Marble Bar airport and I got knocked back. I'm really glad to see it happening now.

What were the most challenging, rewarding or enjoyable parts of the role?

The most challenging part was that, as Shire Councillor, you have to represent the Shire as a whole, not just Marble Bar. The most rewarding was the Senior Citizen of the Year award I received earlier in the year, it was humbling.

Is there anything you would have loved to have done if you had more time?

I'm disappointed to leave when Marble Bar is moving ahead in leaps and bounds with upgrades

to the roads, airport and everything else... It's only just started but I won't be here to see it. It's an exciting time for Marble Bar.

Do you have any advice for anyone looking to get into local government?

Be prepared for a LOT of reading and learning and make sure you have the available time.

What will you miss most about Marble Bar?

The people and the country. Marble Bar is a beautiful place. I've been here since I retired from the CRC in 2014. I stayed here for the people and the lifestyle.

Any final thoughts?

I've enjoyed my time in Marble Bar, 10 years I've been here. I'm sorry to go but circumstances have dictated my course.

Thanks for chatting to us Dean, enjoy your well-deserved retirement!

I'll leave it with a quote from Shire President Cr Lynne Craigie OAM from the Shire media release on the 6th November: "Dean is passionate about achieving outcomes for the people of Marble Bar, and has been a great advocate for the town on Council for the past seven years"

SHIRE STRATEGIC RECREATION MASTER PLAN

Community Consultation Workshop

The Shire of East Pilbara have engaged CCS Strategic Management to develop a 'strategic master plan' for the East Pilbara and on Wednesday the 4th of November a consultation workshop was held at the Civic Centre here in Marble Bar. The consultation was an opportunity for Marble Bar residents to have their say in what will be the very first 'strategic master plan for recreation' in the history of the Shire that incorporates Marble Bar and Nullagine.

After a bite to eat, Hanna Roets, who will soon be taking on the role of Coordinator of Recreation Services with the Shire, introduced Mel and Mark from CCS. Mel took notes and ensured nothing we discussed was forgotten while Mark led the presentation.

To get things started we heard a bit about the history of the Shire and saw a bunch of data and information about the demographics of the Shire and how people typically use recreation facilities. We talked about what new facilities are needed and what work needs to be done to improve our current facilities. We brainstormed some new ideas and came up with a bit of an idea for how we might improve things around the place.

Some of the big things that were highlighted as 'need to improve' were the uninsulated gym (Hanna says the Shire have already planned to deliver some new equipment soon), repairs to the swimming pool and improvements to the rec area particularly the skate park. We also talked about things like accessibility, toilets and water fountains.

We had some ideas for the gym (one short-term idea was to just knock the current gym down and move the equipment somewhere else, maybe the current Shire office, with another more long-term idea to build new gym facilities at the swimming pool.) Everyone agreed that the skate-park needed some TLC and several people were

concerned that there isn't enough seating around the place, including at the RSL park. We all agreed that more shade was a big one, and came up with an idea of creating a nice green space near the rec-shed with a place kids can ride their bikes (maybe a BMX track?) We talked about making safe places people can ride their bikes next to the road instead of on it, and discussed ways of better utilising existing equipment and facilities like the Civic Centre and the blow-up cinema.

All of the ideas raised at the meeting, along with a whole lot of other information including input from Newman and Nullagine and other information gathered discussions with various stakeholders (there's been a lot of consultations!) will be considered by CCS in developing the Master Plan. At this stage the draft is anticipated to be released some time in early 2021.

If you like any of the ideas discussed here (and I definitely haven't covered everything we talked about!) or think we've totally missed the mark and you've got a radical new plan that's going to solve everything, make sure to have your say before the survey closes on Friday the 20th of November! It's important to realise the end result won't cover everything and implementing it won't happen over night - it's a big plan that has to consider a lot of different factors, some of which are probably yet to be apparent. The only thing you can be certain of is that if you don't tell anyone your ideas, they won't happen.

ATLAS IRON COMMUNITY INFORMATION SESSION

On the evening of Thursday the 29th of October, the CRC coordinated a community information session with Atlas Iron at the Marble Bar Civic Centre.

Project Manager Stacey Brown took the stage to deliver a presentation about the Corunna Downs project, beginning with an acknowledgment of the Njamal people.

We learned that Australian owned mining company Atlas Iron have several projects underway in the North West including the Mt. Webber, Miralga and Corunna Downs projects in the Pilbara.

The Corunna Downs site is located 33km south of Marble Bar along the Hillside-Marble Bar Road. Most will be aware of the upgrades currently underway to the Hillside-Marble Bar road, Atlas anticipate the mine access road will be finished by the end of November with the public access section complete by the end of December (fingers crossed the weather goes their way!) Atlas are currently working to develop the mine area and finalise construction on the crushing plant, aiming for the end of January 2021.

The Corunna Downs project is anticipated to produce over the next 5-6 years, with ~5mtpa of lump and fines ores extracted and hauled out to Utah Point (Port Hedland) over the life of the mine.

Atlas have engaged MACA to carry out open-pit mining, CSI for crushing, Assetlink has been awarded the camp management contract and MGM and Qube will handle haulage.



After Stacey had finished her part of the presentation we heard from Atlas' Supervisor of Stakeholder Management Adrian Mudronja. Adrian spoke about the Helping Hands grant program which provides funding for not-for-profit led community projects in the Pilbara. (You can get in touch with Adrian through the CRC.)

Representatives from MACA then spoke a bit about opportunities for employment at the mine. MACA had a stall set up at the information session with brochures and contact information for their recruitment team. (Don't worry if you missed out, we have a bunch of copies at the CRC!)

To tie everything up the evening we heard from Lang Coppin, who spoke about the positive impacts the Atlas project will have on Marble Bar, particularly in regards to the boost to the local economy, opportunities for employment and long-awaited improvements to road infrastructure.

After the speeches were finalised the opportunity for a 'put your hand up and speak' Q&A session was passed up in favour of getting stuck into the BBQ and having a face-to-face chat with the Atlas crew who were more than happy to chat to locals. After grabbing something off the freebie table (those Hancock Prospecting branded cooling towels really do work!) we packed up and headed home.

Thanks again to the crew from Atlas who worked with us to make this session happen, and thanks to the staff and personnel from MACA, Assetlink and CSI who also attended the session and spoke to community members about upcoming opportunities. We look forward to continuing to work together in the future.

2020 WAFES CONFERENCE

Another month, another conference - this time wearing my VFES hat! (not literally, it would have been a pain to carry on the plane...)

In mid October I headed down to Perth to represent the Marble Bar Volunteer Fire and Emergency Services (VFES) brigade at the 2020 Department of Fire and Emergency Services 'Special Edition' Western Australian Fire and Emergency Services conference in Perth. (Whew, bit of a mouthful - I think we'll stick to the acronyms DFES and WAFES from here on out!)

I arrived on the 15th, settling into my room at the very glamorous Crown Metrapol Hotel. The first event on the Special Edition conference itinerary started bright and early on the 16th, as DFES had arranged for each volunteer delegate to attend a day tour of their choosing. There were ten options including tours of Rottnest Island, Fremantle Prison and Perth Zoo - I elected to go whale watching, followed by a lovely lunch at Hillary's Boat Harbour. We saw a couple of fins from a distance, but I was just happy with the opportunity to spend time on out on the water!

After the tours, everyone had a chance to catch up and network at a Sundowner at Burswood on Swan. The Sundowner included an opportunity to check out the new operational fleet. It was a great evening (though it did get very cold towards the end!) and I caught up with people from brigades in the Pilbara and across WA.



The 17th was the day of the conference. Starting at 8am, we all made our way to the ballroom on the other side of the Crown Metrapol - luckily the WAFES conference came with it's own app, complete with maps! He told the fascinating story of the rescue, describing the challenges they faced and the desperate strategies they were forced to adopt in order to bring all twelve children (and their coach) home safely.

Priya shared her story of being diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy as an infant, and going on to compete with the Australian swimming team to win a total of nine gold, 3 silver and 4 bronze Paralympic medals.

Annual General Meetings for the various Volunteer Associations were held following the conference.



At 6pm, we all returned to the ballroom dressed in our finery for the 'Glitz and Glam' themed Awards Gala Dinner.

The award was in recognition of their efforts in locating the little girl and her dog from Noreena Downs this January after they had been missing for three days during the flooding from Cyclone Blake. 

Due to misinformation, history of some events or places can become inaccurate over time, as is the case with this site on top of a very rugged rocky range, The Rippon Hills Crater

Back in 1960, the exact month I cannot recall myself, members of the family and the Aboriginal folk on Yarrie Station witnessed an unforgettable sighting. We all observed in the early evening a glowing object falling at a great speed in an easterly direction. We all agreed it must have fallen somewhere on Warrwagine Station, which was to the east of us.

The place where this object made impact was on top of a range of hills called the Rippon Hills. Today it is spelt Ripon and this could be the basis as to why the crater is identified as a sink hole. In England there is a city called Ripon, which is vulnerable to sinkholes appearing. The country where this crater is, is no English countryside!



ANIMAL WATCH:

SCORPION

I came across a scorpion in my clothes basket the other day, hence it being this month's animal! As usual when you start researching it ends up becoming pretty interesting and the scorpion was no exception.

Scorpions of many varieties are very common Australia wide. Scorpions are arachnids which means they are related to animals such as spiders and ticks. Some prefer the cooler climates and forests of the south and some like the desert. They either live under logs, rocks or under the bark on trees. The scorpions that live in our area (desert scorpions) dig deep spiral burrows and will mostly stay underground in the cool during the day and come out at night to feed, though it is not unusual to see them during the day. Scorpions also glow or fluoresce under UV light, which is usually how scientists find them in the field.

Scorpions feed on beetles, spiders and centipedes to name a few. The majority of scorpions are ambush hunters and lay in wait until their prey is close enough to attack. They have six to twelve pairs of eyes but don't have very good eyesight, they do however have sensory hairs and slit organs on their legs which help them to pick up vibrations and scents. Scorpions breathe through four pairs of lungs on the underside of their abdomen. Females are a larger build than the males and have shorter tails.

Females give birth to live young. The young are very pale and the mother carries them around on her back for up to a few weeks until they strong enough to become independent. Scorpions take a long time to reach full maturity, moulting up to six times in a six year period in order to grow. They can live anywhere between two to ten years with some being recorded as living for 25 years.

Australian scorpions can give a nasty sting but are not deadly to humans. A sting can cause pain and inflammation for several hours though, so make sure to wear gloves and shoes when working outside to avoid being stung.

Scorpions are actually pretty good pest controllers so it's not a bad thing to have them around - so if you too come across one in your clothes basket, take it for a bit of a walk and let it go like I did!

MARBLE BAR Sensational Accident

- November 15 1898 -

A narrow escape from death occurred on Saturday evening to a miner named Olaf Anderson, while he was being lowered with a windlass and rope down the Ironclad battery well. The pin of the windlass snapped, precipitating Anderson to the bottom of the well, a distance of over 80ft.

The man at the brace promptly lowered another rope, which Anderson in a state of semi-consciousness grabbed and was hauled up. He sustained a deep cut close to the right temple, and lesser injuries to the body and limbs. He was able to walk into the town and was admitted to the hospital

EXPLOSION MYSTERY AT STATION

- November 22 1949 -

MARBLE BAR; There was a mysterious explosion at Corunna Downs Station at 3.20am on Sunday. Portion of buildings near the staff quarters were blown up. Cause of the explosion not known yet and

police found no clues. Two rooms made of reinforced concrete were demolished. The doors were thrown 50 feet. Two sleeping children were not seriously injured when a concrete wall fell on them. Station manager George Turvey is on a visit to Perth.

MARBLE BAR TRAGEDY SAUNIER'S TRIAL ENDS

Verdict of Not Guilty

- November 22 1938 -

A criminal court jury yesterday returned a verdict of not guilty, at the conclusion of the three day's trial of Robert Norman Saunier (26), builder and carpenter, of View Street Subiaco. The accused, on hearing the jury foreman announce the verdict of acquittal, behaved with the composure which had marked his demeanour throughout the proceedings. An outburst of applause in the public gallery was quickly suppressed by court officials.

The charge against Saunier, which he denied, was that he wilfully murdered Gerard Peter Walmsley (27), rigger, of Gloster Street Subiaco, on the Marble Bar-Nullagine road, between Marble

Bar and Mt Edgar station, on September 10 last. The trial judge was Mr Justice Draper. The prosecution was conducted by the Crown Prosecutor (Mr SH Good), and Saunier was defended by Messrs. AC Muir and R Trethowan (instructed by Messrs. Unmack and Unmack)

Saunier and Walmsley had been close friends since their schooldays, and at the time of the shooting were partners in a prospecting venture at Marble Bar. The prosecution alleged that the shot which ended Walmsley's life (a bullet entered his chest, became shattered against his fifth rib, and in pieces perforated his liver and lung, causing almost instantaneous death) was fired by Saunier following a trivial argument. Evidence was given that on the afternoon of the shooting, his face wet with blood and tears, and apparently very drunk, said to Constable Marshall, of Marble Bar, "They tell me that I have shot my mate -- surely it can't be true! Gerry was the best mate I ever had." "I will never drink cursed beer again" The jury's verdict of not guilty was returned at 3.40pm after a retirement of one hour.

THUNDERSTORMS AT MARBLE BAR

Man and His Wife Struck by Lightning

- November 24 1909 -

Thunderstorms have been of daily occurrence since Friday, although only one place received a good fall of rain. At Warrawoona 175 points were recorded, and 53 points fell at Marble Bar. This was the most recorded in November for eight years.

Mr A.G McCarthy and his wife, who were camped in the hills, 15 miles out, were struck by lightning on Saturday, but only slightly injured. The front pole of the camp was shattered.

THE PIONEERS OF MARBLE BAR

Some Incidents of their Prospecting Career

- November 1894 -

On April 21, 1801, Messrs E Francis, H Jenkins and W Edmonstone pitched their camp on the Coongan River, about three miles from the present town site of Marble Bar, intending to prospect the neighbourhood for alluvial gold. Two days later Mr Francis was successful in finding payable gold in a gully near the now Homeward Bound Gold mine, and on the following day the three plucky prospectors were all on gold in different gullies near the prospecting claim. On May 1 Mr Francis rode over to Nullagine and made application to Warden Davis for a reward claim, and the

three mates worked out a good deal of ground and were rewarded with a fair amount of gold, the exact weight being only known to themselves, but it is generally believed on the field to have been a few hundred ounces. While at work one day, one of the trio had just unearthed a splendid specimen containing about ten ounces of gold, when a stranger suddenly appeared on the scene, and the lucky digger just had time to drop the nugget on the ground and sit on it, as he did not care to let the stranger know what he was getting. As he sat in this position, chatting with the stranger, a gust of wind blew his hat off his head, but our hero did not move, though the sun poured down its scorching rays on his uncovered head, he was determined not to get up for the hat, for to do that meant the revealing of his hidden treasure. The intruder, however, not finding his addressee in a very communicative mood, soon took his departure, and the three mates worked on unmolested, except for the threats from some of the fossicking crowd who posted notices of objection to the granting of the reward claim, and also talked of jumping, but it all ended in smoke.

A month after this application had been made. Messrs. Francis and party took up the prospecting claim for reefing purposes, and after twelve months work transferred it to Messrs. Hodgen and Indell. They then annexed the Stray Shot lease, and since the Excelsior, the two conjoined making a fine property of ten acres. Both leases are now developed into first class mines, and a five head battery has been erected thereon,

and is supplied with water from a well 70 feet in depth. The battery, which was built at Langland's foundry, Melbourne, is a splendid plant. The first cost of it is Melbourne was £1122, but before it was ready to start crushing an additional £1878 had to be paid by these enterprising pioneers. Since its erection it has been constantly, by night and by day, crushing stone from the proprietors own mine and from other leases. The main shaft of the Stray Shot mine is down 100 feet, the last 50 feet being sank on a reef of highly payable stone, which the owners are now preparing to take out. A straight shaft is being sunk to cut the reef, which should be met with in a few days. Since the erection of the battery (named the Excelsior), last July, the proprietors have crushed for themselves from the Stray Shot and Excelsior a total of 750 tons for the splendid yield of 24220s, and they have about [...] of similar stone on the surface.




